Useful Facts for Germany

Electricity: Standard voltage is 230 volts, and an adapter is required.

Emergency phone numbers: 110 for the police, 112 for fire and ambulance services.

Entry requirements and visa: To enter Germany, foreigners need a valid passport or passport replacement documents. U.S. citizens with a valid U.S. passport do not need a visa for airport transit, leisure or business trips for stays for up to 90 days. On the planned date of departure from Germany, the passport should be valid for at least another three months. Citizens of certain countries require a visa; individual German diplomatic missions can provide more information.

ETIAS: The implementation of the European Travel Information and Authorization System (ETIAS) is anticipated to commence in the first half of 2025. Visa-exempt non-EU nationals will be required to present a pre-clearance permit to enter Germany and 29 other European countries. The permit will be valid for three years at a cost of EUR 7 for adults (18 to 70 years of age) and allow multiple visits.

Language: The main language is German, but English is widely spoken throughout the country.

Listed information is subject to change.

Mobile phone service: To use a U.S. smartphone, the device has to be unlocked by the provider. A rechargeable German SIM card with a German phone number and individual data plan can be purchased at mobile shops, supermarkets and drugstores. Using international roaming services is another option.

Money and currency: The euro (EUR) is the legal currency. A nationwide network of ATMs at various banks is available to withdraw cash 24/7. All major credit cards are accepted. The stated prices in shops and restaurants are prices including taxes.

Opening hours: Most stores open Monday to Friday around 9 a.m. and close between 6 p.m. and 8 p.m. On Saturdays, most shops close between 2 p.m. and 4 p.m., though some larger stores and shopping centers may stay open until 6 p.m. or 8 p.m. On Sundays and holidays, all shops are closed. Special exceptions apply for bakeries, gas stations, shops in tourist resorts, train stations and airports. Certain pharmacies also offer 24-hour service.

Tax-free shopping: VAT is 19 percent on most merchandise. U.S. travelers are able to benefit from tax-free shopping with a minimum purchase of EUR 50.01 in many stores throughout Germany. When leaving the EU, the VAT on purchased goods can be reclaimed for a small fee.

Time zone: Central European Time (CET) - six hours ahead of EST and nine hours ahead of PST.

Tipping: Restaurant bills include VAT and service charges. A 10 percent tip is common

What Travelers to Europe Need to Know about **ETIAS**

The implementation of the European Travel Information and Authorization System (ETIAS) is anticipated to commence in the first half of 2025. Visa-exempt non-EU nationals will be required to hold a pre-clearance permit to enter 30 European countries. The permit will be valid for three years or until the passport expires, whichever comes first. The application fee is EUR 7 for adults (18 to 70 years of age) and allows multiple visits within the valid period. Travelers will have to fill out an online application form prior to their trip. Once launched, the system will conduct checks against EU information systems for border security and, in the vast majority of cases, issue a travel authorization within minutes.

MEISSEN – The Magic of "White Gold"

Amidst the beauty of the Dresden Elbland with their picturesque countryside, fine vineyards, Elbe Riverbank and the nearby historical city center of Meissen lies one of Germany's most famous cultural assets: the MEISSEN Porcelain Manufactory.

The great craft of porcelain production dates back to 1710, when Augustus the Strong, Elector of Saxony and King in Poland, established Europe's first such manufactory. Ever since, MEISSEN porcelain has been a byword for the highest standards in design. In the west of Germany – and the heart of Europe – North Rhine-Westphalia (NRW) serves up a wide variety of experiences for travel clients. Erfurt – A Charming Medieval Capital

Erfurt, the state capital of Thuringia, is characterized by its medieval city center, one of the best preserved in Germany. It is a charming blend of wealthy patrician townhouses and lovingly reconstructed half-timbered buildings overlooked by the towering spires of St. Mary's Cathedral and St. Severus Church. The Merchants' Bridge is the only one of its kind; with a length of 393 feet and incorporating 32 houses, it is the longest inhabited bridge in Europe. Right next to Cathedral Hill, Petersberg Citadel, the only extensively preserved Baroque city fortress in Central Europe, invites your travel clients to explore its intricate maze of underground passageways.

The city has always attracted great minds, especially those who significantly influenced the spirit of their age, including Martin Luther, Johann Wolfgang von Goethe, Friedrich von Schiller, Johann Sebastian Bach and Napoleon Bonaparte. Buildings relating to these figures, such as the Augustinian Monastery and the Imperial Hall, have been reconstructed and now give visitors a faithful and realistic image of the past.

ERFURT'S JEWISH-MEDIEVAL UNESCO WORLD HERITAGE

Erfurt's history is inextricably linked with that of its Jewish community. The unique Jewish-Medieval Heritage of Erfurt was awarded UNESCO World Heritage status in September 2023. The designation encompasses the Old Synagogue, one of the oldest, largest and best-preserved medieval synagogues in Europe; the Medieval Mikveh (ritual bath), which dates back to the 12th century; and a secular Jewish building from the 12th and 13th century known as the Stone House. They all bear witness to the early blossoming of Central European Jewish culture, and to its abrupt end following a wave of pogroms in the middle of the 14th century. The Old Synagogue is home to a museum that highlights the history of Erfurt's Jewish community in the Middle Ages. The standout exhibit here is the Erfurt Treasure, including an exquisitely crafted Jewish wedding ring.

The best way for clients to get to know the city is via a guided tour on foot, by tram or by carriage. The Erfurt Tourist Office also offers guided tours in the footsteps of famous figures, along with excursions through Thuringia and some of the area's great gardens, including the "egapark" horticultural exhibition.

Events on tap for 2025 include the open-air Cathedral Steps Festival (La Bohéme), the 700th Anniversary of the Merchants' Bridge and the 175th traditional Christmas Market.

Nowadays, Erfurt is a modern and welcoming state capital. Good access by road and train, sufficient lodging possibilities and the hospitality of the people will make a stay in Erfurt both comfortable and pleasant. A number of restaurants, cafés and beer gardens offer the famous Thüringer Bratwurst and beer as well as the Thüringer Klösse (dumplings) and delicious traditional pastries.

Lutherland – Birthplace of the German Reformation

In the heart of Germany, the states of Saxony-Anhalt and Thuringia combine to form Lutherland, an area rich with historical associations, especially those related to the German Reformation as sparked by the priest and theologian Martin Luther.

There are 11 monumental UNESCO World Heritage Sites here, including Wartburg Castle and the historical Bauhaus properties in Dessau and Weimar. Visitors also will find a broad variety of picture-book villages, princely palaces and gardens, landmark homes of romantic poets, imposing churches and ancient beech forests. Food and drink are justly celebrated and enjoyed in Lutherland as well, as served in myriad restaurants, beer gardens, cozy countryside inns and a wine region named after the rivers Saale and Unstrut.

The Luther sites in Eisleben and Wittenberg will prove of special interest to travel clients. The reformer was born in Eisleben in 1483 and died there 63 years later. The rooms of the two Luther-related houses in town are equipped with period furniture that allows one to step virtually back into the past.

Visitors can walk the cobblestone streets of Eisleben's ancient Latin Quarter, enjoy the silence of the historic university church, where young Luther

attended services, and marvel at the magnificent "Roses and Parrots" window in the Augustinian monastery church, where flowers like the ones on display once served as a model for the Luther family's coat of arms.

Wittenberg is the site of St. Mary's Church, where Luther often preached but, more importantly, the town is where the German Reformation began. According to legend, Luther hammered his famous 95 theses on the door of All Saints' Church on October 31, 1517, to protest the Catholic church's policy of selling salvation to the faithful in the form of "indulgences." To stand onsite is to feel the direct pull of the momentous events of more than 500 years ago.

At Wartburg Castle in Eisenach, about three hours southwest from Wittenberg, Luther spent several months in disguise to hide from his enemies. While laying low here he began his translation of the Bible, an act that made the development of a unified German language possible. The Luther House in Eisenach offers an absorbing interactive exhibit to commemorate it.

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Fall of the **Berlin Wall**

35TH ANNIVERSARY OF THE FALL OF THE BERLIN WALL

The Fall of the Berlin Wall on November 9, 1989 marked an unparalleled moment in history, a jubilant day that resonated with joy and hope for people across the globe. From 1961 to 1989, the Berlin Wall stood as a harsh symbol of division, separating families, friends and entire communities.

One of the most enduring remnants of this historical divide is the East Side Gallery, a preserved section of the wall adorned with poignant artwork, including the iconic "Fraternal Kiss." The Peaceful Revolution

35 YEARS SINCE THE PEACEFUL REVOLUTION IN LEIPZIG

Leipzig played a pivotal role with the Peaceful Revolution that led to the Fall of the Berlin Wall and the reunification of Germany. On October 9, 1989, over 70,000 citizens gathered for a peaceful demonstration, which became a crucial turning point in ending the oppressive regime of East Germany. This event, sparked by regular peace prayers at St. Nicholas Church, demonstrated the power of non-violent protest and paved the way for German unity.

On October 9, 2024, Leipzig will commemorate the 35th anniversary of this historic revolution with an expanded Festival of Lights. The festival will feature around 20 light installations by international artists along the historic Monday Demonstration route. Special events include the Peace Prayer and the Speech on Democracy. Visitors will also be able to place candles on a podium to form an illuminated "89," reflecting the symbolic role candles played during the original demonstrations.

Among these, the Dresden Striezelmarkt, regularly voted as the favorite Christmas market in German-speaking countries, stands out as the oldest Christmas market in Germany, celebrating its 590th year in 2024. Bach, Mendelssohn, Wagner, and both Clara and Robert Schumann, are just a few outstanding examples of those so honored. The annual Mendelssohn Festival in early November is one highlight. Another is the program of concerts offered by the Gewandhausorchester, the oldest civic symphony orchestra in the world, which will be themed after Shostakovich, from May 15 to June 1, 2025.

The Gewandhausorchester also invites music lovers to its regular Grand Concert on Thursdays and Fridays. Meanwhile, in a tradition running for more than 800 years, the sacred choral compositions put on by the St. Thomas Boys' Choir can still be heard at St. Thomas Church each Friday and Saturday. Then there is Bachfest, the next iteration of which runs June 12 to June 22, 2025. Themed to "Transformation," the festival will feature various concerts and performances by star musicians who will partner with young artists to create bold new interpretations of Bach's work. www.leipzig.travel/cityofmusic

A CELEBRATION OF FREEDOM

When the first prayers for peace were held in Leipzig's St. Nicholas Church in 1982, nobody imagined that this modest effort would be the harbinger of a revolution. But by October 9, 1989, when some 70,000 people congregated in the city's streets to denounce the old Soviet-style system of the German Democratic Republic (GDR) and demand reform, the reunification of East and West Germany was finally in view.

Now, every October 9, Leipzig commemorates the historic breaking down of walls with a festive program including exhibitions, readings, a peace prayer in St. Nicholas Church (where it all began) and the Festival of Lights, a stunning display of high-tech illumination.

Visitors can learn more about the Peaceful Revolution in the Memorial Museum in the Runde Ecke (Round Corner) and by perusing the files secretly kept on East German citizens in the Federal Office for Stasi Documents. The city's Forum of Contemporary History is dedicated to exploring the division, dictatorship, resistance and overall life in the former GDR.

The western sector of Leipzig is home to an impressive industrial heritage, where old factory buildings invite visitors to immerse themselves in new forms of culture and art. The former cotton mill known as the Spinnerei is the creative heart of the city and home to the gallery of Neo Rauch, co-founder of the New Leipzig School of Painting. Nearby, the Karl Heine Canal meanders through this quarter, offering an opportunity to explore the city on a floating guided tour or alone in a canoe. Other canals extend into New Lakeland, a center for water sports, while some 20 lakes, created from former open-cast lignite mines, add to the city's allure for those seeking fun on the water. www.leipzig.travel/industrial-culture
